# Soc 452H. Theories, Models and Methods in Demography

### **Summary**

This is a small project oriented undergraduate course that will examine the key theories, models, methods and data sources in demography. The maximum enrollment is 25 students. Grades are based on both individual and group work. Individually, students will complete one exercise on a topic such as constructing a life table, calculating mortality, fertility, and migration rates, and applying concepts of stable population theory in making projections. In groups of 3-4 students, students will complete a research report that poses a demographic question, identifies related theories and hypotheses, and analyzes data using appropriate methods. The instructor will advise each group along the way. As we move further into the semester, part of our discussion in class will focus on your research projects, seeking to relate your research interests to the course material. The instructor will discuss project options early in the semester.

Having some background in demography is recommended but not essential for success in this course. A prerequisite for taking this course is having completed a 300+ level sociology course. Students without this prerequisite will be automatically removed without notice.

### **Evaluation**

There are three components of final grades -- contributing to in-class discussion (25%), individual exercise (25%) due Oct 22nd, and group project (50%) due Monday, Nov 18th.

# **Readings and Class Discussion**

With the exception of the Levi-Bacci book (available for purchase as a hardcopy or e-book on Amazon.ca), the readings can be downloaded from the course website on portal (portal.utoronto.ca). The readings and discussion will introduce you to demographic theories, models, data, and methods. Some of the readings are general overviews of topic areas, while others provide case studies of what questions can be answered with demographic data and methods. Students should be prepared to discuss the readings in class. The instructor will supplement the discussion of the readings with illustrations of demographic measures and methods.

### Attendance

Class attendance is important. Contributing to in-class discussion is worth 25% of your final grade.
